Keynote Speech by Hon. Dr. Devender Kawday Sir:

Dr. Devender Kawday, Hon. Advisor, NAAC, Bengaluru was the chief Guest and key-note speaker in the Seminar. He delivered in his key-note speech with the explanations of how the institutions should learn to encash the available resources for its own benefits. He emphasized that realization is extremely important in every aspect of life. He opined that one has to be unique and creative in teaching, learning and research and refrain following repeated and traditional methods. He elaborated that there are 13 probable skills like communication, creativity, critical thinking, people's management, sustainable development, technical knowledge, multidisciplinary, emotional intelligence, decision making, service-oriented, etc. for teaching, learning and research. Research should be useful for society. He viewed that the satisfaction in any work is immensely important. He quoted "When we keep doing what we are doing, we keep getting what we are getting, if we want to get the results, we should do what have never done before."

He opined that the value of the sun can be understood by those sustaining through it like humans, plants. Similarly, an individual is valuable only when others acknowledge it. Teaching is good but the process of learning need not be necessarily good for all. He opined that those involved in any crucial process of the institution like the NAAC should be kept

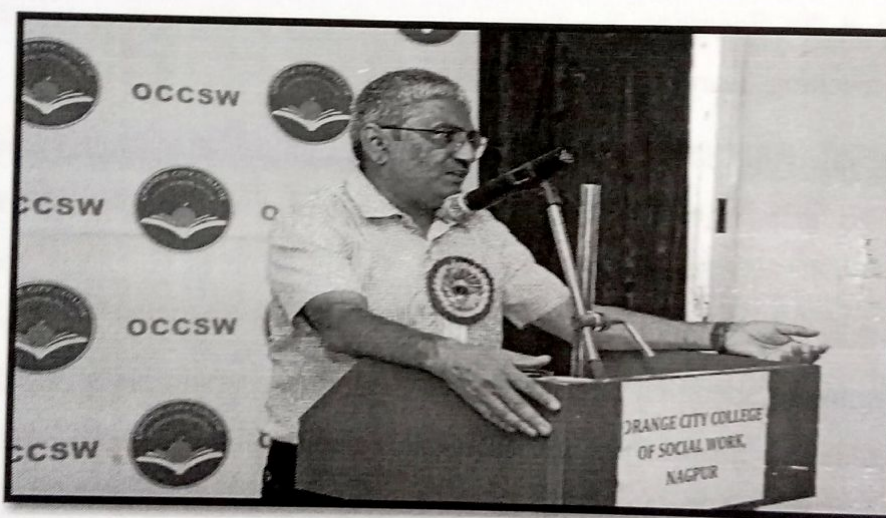
motivated. The responsibility of bringing social change falls on the shoulders of the Social Work College in every aspect of life for betterment of the society. There are various types of people working in society like shopkeepers, peasants, professionals, corporate who are busy in their lives. They don't have time to think about the society. He opined that today the technology and digitalization are made essential component of human for comfort their life and digital literacy is essentially made the needs of the time as well as for human comfort too. Today the younger generation makes themselves smart generation by using digitalization and even senior generations are using digitalization for betterment and future. He appreciated the initiative adopted by the institution for working for the elevation of the LGBTQ and Third Gender community and hailed that the college is the only an institution having uniqueness all over the India.

- **First Technical Session: 12:00 to 1:15 pm**

'Awareness of Digital Assistance along with Opportunities and Threats including Health Impacts among the Academic Stakeholders in Teaching, Learning and Research'

The first technical session was chaired by Dr. Raju Kasare, Hon. Coordinator, IQAC, Athawale College of Social Work, Chimur. The key notes speaker of the session was Dr. Kapil Singhel, Hon. Coordinator, IQAC, Vasantrao Naik Government Institute of Arts and Social Sciences, Nagpur. Dr. Singhel opined that the technology is an important part of education. He provided a glimpse into the history of technology in education. He focused upon the issues like advent of technology in this modern era, its changing circumstances and advent of technology in Teaching, Learning and Research. He draw the drastic contradiction among the schools with developed infrastructure and the school struggling for basic facilities.

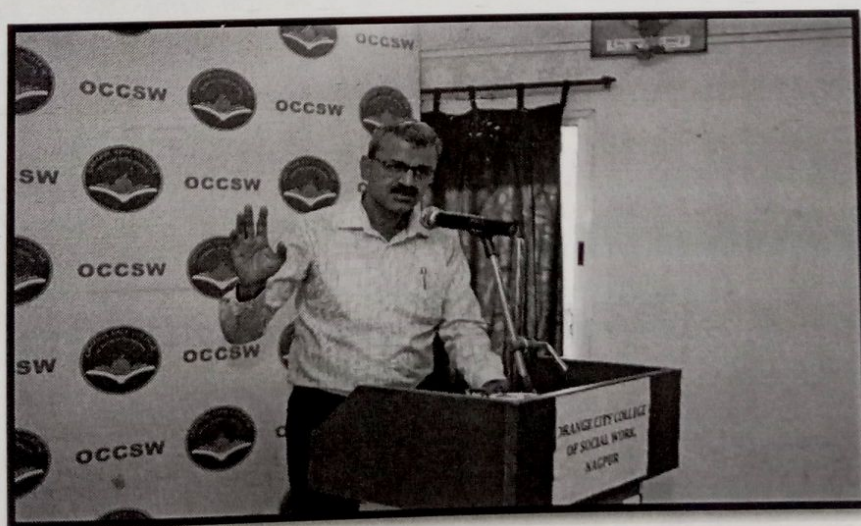
His presentation explained the effect of online education on mental and physical health of the students. He felt that the entire society is the stakeholder of the education including parents, students, publishers, policy makers, management. The pandemic changed the educational scenario by giving momentum to digital education in every field. Technology is very important as without it, one cannot develop or grow. However, it has two sides, positive and negative which has to be accepted. As far as the technology is concerned, India is late using it, but the developed countries like America started it almost 15 years back. He shared that we should appreciate the contribution of great thinkers and follow the same in our life. In his presentation he briefly reviewed the historical journey of technology in education

beginning from 1780 when the teacher was center of education to being backdated technology of projectors, cassette recorder, Calculator, Xerox, calculator in 1972 and till the age of digitalization. He explained how technology has taken a center stage when in earlier days, mobiles were not allowed in college, but now it is indispensable. He traced that www, google and internet change education way back in the beginning of century.

- **Second Technical Session: 2:00 to 3.15 pm**

Implicitly, the term also refers to the sweeping changes brought about by digital computing and communication technologies during this period. From analogous to the Agricultural Revolution and the First Industrial Revolution (1770-1840), the Digital Revolution marked the beginning of the Information Age.

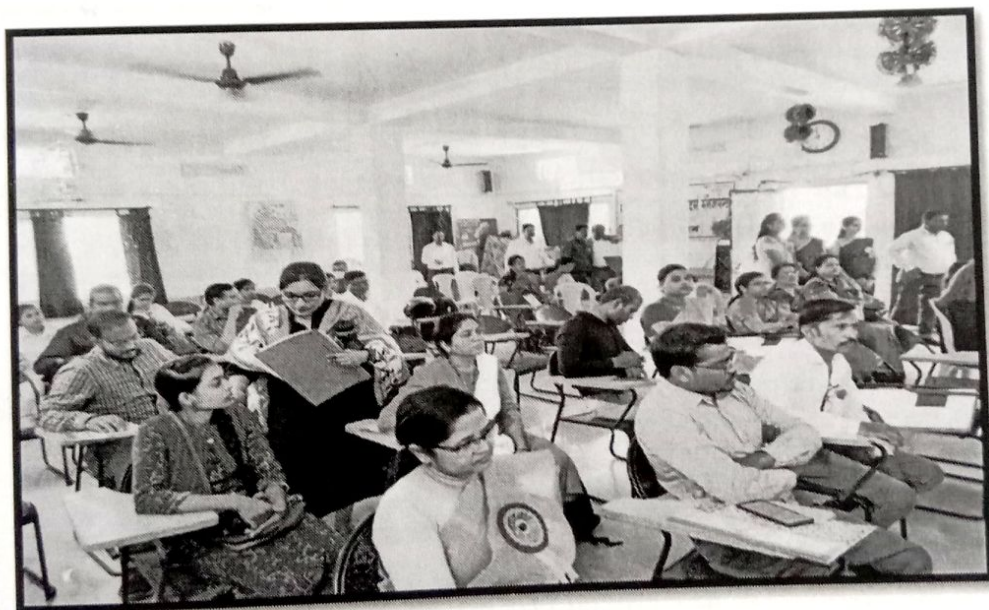
➤ **Session - 3 : Paper presentation and Open Discussion: 3:30 to 4:00 pm**

Introduction: A six days Faculty Development Programme was organized by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell for the teaching, non-teaching faculties and the students. The programme was organized with the aim of polishing the skills among and inculcating new skills within the teaching, non-teaching faculties and the students of the college in tune with the changing academic trends. The FDP was scheduled from 15th April to 20th April, 2023.

During the programme, resource person from different government colleges and universities were invited to facilitate as the resource person. Moreover, an exposure visit at Sarthi Trust, Nagpur was organized as well.

15th April, 2023: The **Inaugural ceremony** was organized. During the ceremony, Dr. Kedarsingh Rotele, Hon. President, Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur, Ms. Kajol Rotele, Hon. Director, Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur, Dr. Amod Gurjar, Mahatma Gandhi International Hindi University, Wardha, Dr. Jivan Chahande, Govt. Veterinary College Nagpur, Dr. Mahendrakumar Meshram, Officiating Principal, Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur and Dr. Kalpana Jamgade, Coordinator, Internal Quality Assurance Cell, Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur facilitated the session.

The first session on '**Soft Skill Development**', Dr. Jivan Chahande provided the faculties an idea on the need of various skill development with the aim of employment generation. He insisted that each and every individual can start his business or entrepreneurship with the amount of resources at the disposal and the use of various government schemes. During the session, the students enthusiastically share their queries on how they can start various business or small scale industry at the minimum capital and generate employment for others. The program was chaired by Dr. Kavita Kanholkar, Member, Board of Studies, (Women Studies), RTMNU, Nagpur.

In the second session on '**Introduction to SPSS**' was conducted by Dr. Amod Gurjar. He explained the nuances of SPSS in the field of research. He at length discussed how different tools of SPSS can be used for Ph.D., Major and Minor Research Projects. A demo of the same using samples for research was used to give a clearer understanding of the tool. The session was chaired by Prof. Dipratna Raut, Assoct. Prof. OCCSW, Nagpur.

In the third session, '**Special Welfare Measures for Divyangans**', Mr. Harish Chakole, Ph.D Scholar, OCCSW, Nagpur shared in detail, the different welfare measures offered by State and Central Govt. for the benefit of the physically challenged. He opined that the govt. has various welfare measures for the Divyangans that can help them to establish themselves

without the need of support or mercy of any other. However, the problem lies in the fact that the beneficiaries of the same are unaware of these schemes and hence due to their ignorance they suffer in their lives. The session was chaired by Prof. Sulok Raghuwanshi, Asst. Prof. OCCSW, Nagpur.

17th April, 2023: The first session on '**Intellectual Property Rights**' was conducted by Dr. Vikesh Lade, Laxminaryan Institute of Technology, Nagpur. Dr. Lade explained the nuances of IPR and its uses in research in the academic field. He opined that the academic fraternity should be cautious of the pitfall of trespassing the limits of the Intellectual Property. He also shared the various sources of safeguarding the research outputs by copyright and patents of the same. He also added that patenting helps to encourage the academic integrity.

In the following session on '**Environment Consciousness**', Mr. Bishwajeet Mitra, Retd. IAS, Govt. of India stressed the need of developing environment consciousness among the people at the backdrop of the rising dangers and threats to the environment. The rising urbanization, industrialization, globalization pose a positive threat to the environment. He opined that the major response to these problems happens to be plantation, reduction in pollution, reduction in deforestation, etc.

18th April, 2023: The first session on '**Information Communication Technology**', conducted by Dr. Priyanka Pitale, YCCE, Hingna Nagpur provided information on ICT. She said that ICT is the need of time. The students can use ICT for research, further studies, admissions for higher studies, presentations, etc. She also opined that post Covid ICT has been a successful means for research. The ICT is now an indispensable part of the school curriculum as well. This provides an opportunity to the students to gain knowledge regarding the same at a very early age.

In the following session, a **visit at Sarthi Trust, Nagpur** was organized. During the visit, the faculties and the students interacted with the third gender community associated with the trust. The experiences of the community depicted the plight of the third gender, who had to fight for the equal rights and justice in the day- to- day life, were shared by the members. During the visit, Mr Anand Chandrani and Mr. Nikunj Joshi, Sarthi Trust shared their experiences along with other members with the students and faculties.

19th April, 2023: The first session on '**Stress Management**' was organized wherein Dr. Puja Batra, Assoct. Prof. Institute of Science, Nagpur facilitated as the resource person. She discussed regarding the different causes of stress in different fields like work place, home, peer, etc. leading to various health problems at the very young age. She opined that the stress has been a major reason for the early and rising mortality rate among the present generation. She also discussed at length various methods of dealing with the stress in daily life. The program was graced as the chair person by Ms. Kalpana Mukunde.

In the second session, Dr. Indrayani, Assoct. Prof. Jhulelal Institute of Engineering, Nagpur oriented regarding the '**New Education Policy 2020**'. She in her discourse at length dealt with various topics like different social problems, health issues, quality education as the need of the time, etc. To elaborate her thoughts, she cited the examples from Indian history and

mythology. She also opined that the language diversity is one of the major issue in the implementation of NEP. However, NEP aims at creating responsible citizen and eradicating the unemployment in the country. By changing the pedagogy the students can be empowered and the academic flexibility can be provided to the students. The program was concluded with the chairmanship of Prof. Shalini Tore.

20th April, 2023: The first session of the concluding day was graced by Mr. Navin Mungle, Deputy Registrar, RTMNU , Nagpur and Mr. Anil Nimsarkar, Office Superintendent, Govt. Medical College, Nagpur. The session on '**Orientation of Service Rules**' explained in detail the various rules and rights of the employee of the institution. They spoke about different kinds of leaves like Casual Leave, Special Leave, Study Leave, Leave taken for special purpose, etc. They also discuss various acts and schemes that govern the employees of the government and private organization. They also explained how the government employees are entitled for various schemes of benefit. They create awareness regarding the job chart of various government employees and the output so expected by them . The session was concluded under the chairmanship of Mr. Ulhas Nikhade, Clerk.

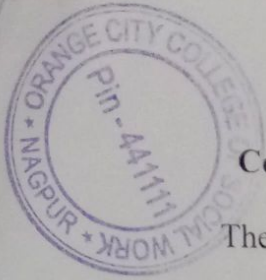
A One-Day Workshop on 'Intellectual Property Rights'

Introduction:

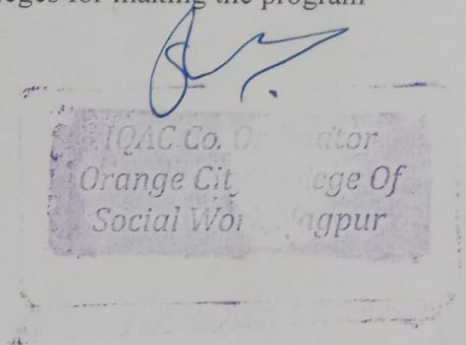
A one-day workshop on 'Intellectual Property Rights' was organized by Internal Quality Assurance Cell was organized at the college. The workshop was organized with the aim of creating awareness regarding the concept of Intellectual Property Rights. Dr. Vikesh Lade, Laxminarayan Institute of Technology, Nagpur opined that the social purpose is to provide protection for the results of investment in the development of new technology, thus giving the incentive and means to finance research and development activities. A functioning intellectual property regime should also facilitate the transfer of technology in the form of foreign direct investment, joint ventures and licensing. The protection is usually given for a finite term (typically 20 years in the case of patents). While the basic social objectives of intellectual property protection are as outlined above, it should also be noted that the exclusive rights given are generally subject to a number of limitations and exceptions, aimed at fine-tuning the balance that has to be found between the legitimate interests of right holders and of users. IP falls into two groups—work covered by patent law and work covered by copyright law. Both categories have undergone significant change over the last generation. In response, university policies have either evolved or been radically revised.

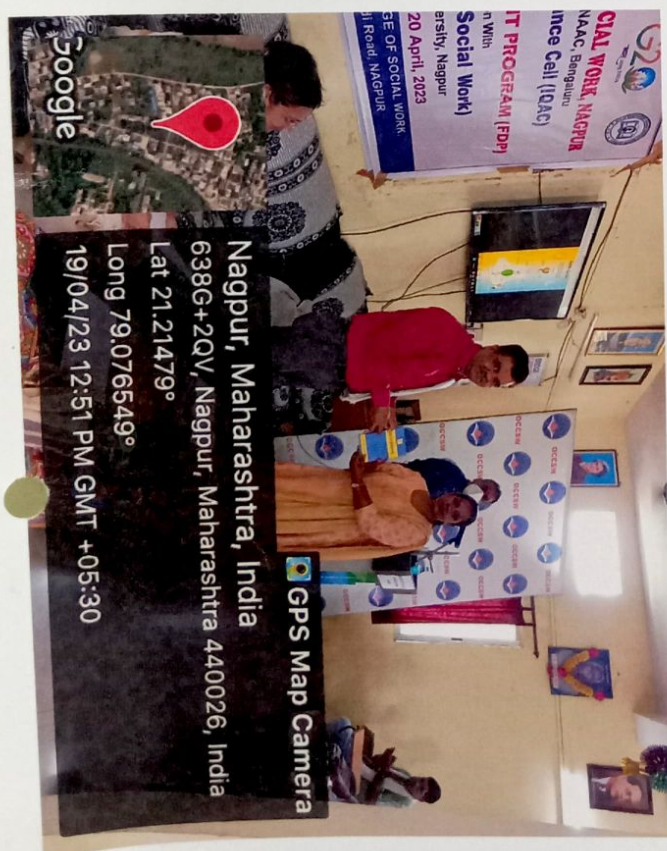
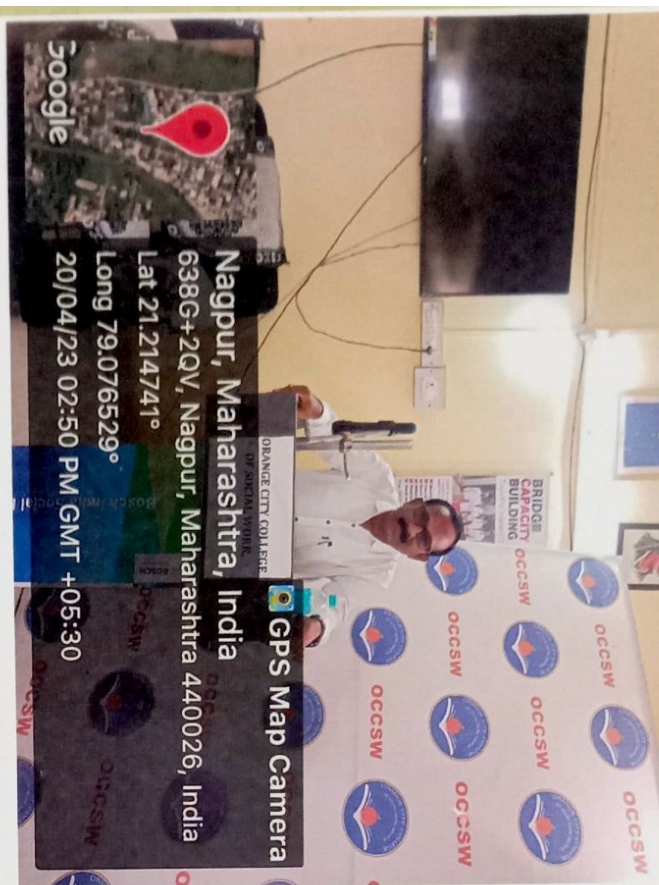
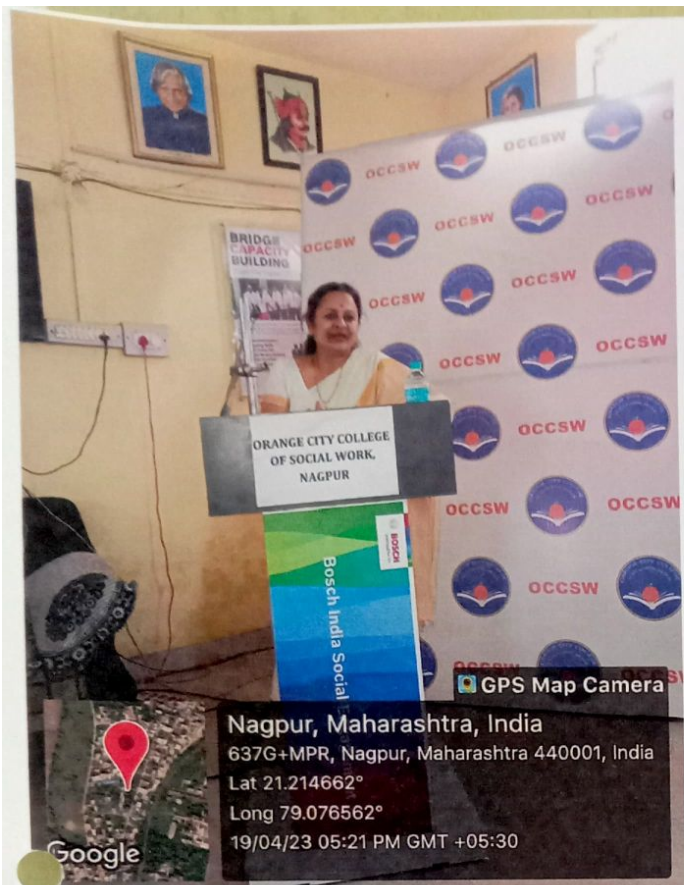
Dr. Kedarsingh Rotele, Hon. President, Gram Utkarsh Shikshan Sanstha, Nagpur many campus copyright policies remain good, but they are being undermined by the online course revolution, including the wave of interest in massive open online courses (MOOCs), (SWAYAM) since many institutions have sought to deny faculty members their traditional rights to the instructional materials they author. Campus patent policies, however, have taken a radical turn for the worse, with a number of campuses revising them to mandate automatic institutional ownership of the fruits of scholarly work. We provide recommended language both for patent and online instruction policies.

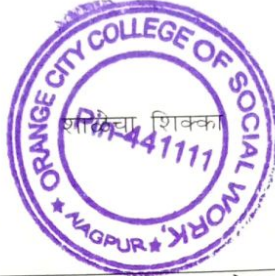

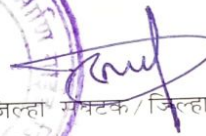

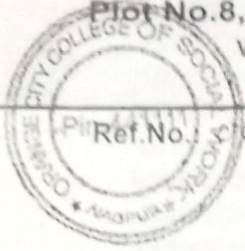

Greetings from the college. Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur was established on 10th December, 1999 on the eve of International Human Rights Day by the visionary and the stalwart in the field of social work, Dr. Chandansingh Rotele, Hon. President, Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur under the auspice of Gram Utkarsh Shikshan Sanstha, Nagpur. The college is recognized by Govt. of Maharashtra and it is affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University Nagpur & University Grants Commission, New Delhi under section-2 (f). The institution is accredited 'B+' grade by NAAC, Bengaluru. It was started with the aim and purpose of serving the society and its students should have the mind of serving the Country.

The college believes that the aim of serving the society through the means of education, helping the students grapple with the scarcity of resources. The right of education should be accessible to each and every child, irrespective of socio-economic status, has been the driving force behind the establishment of the college. The limitation to accessibility of resources should not stand in the way of students striving to achieve education in life, had been college's motto.

The college has various feathers to its cap like felicitation by the prestigious India Today magazine for providing quality education at affordable cost, inception of new courses, onset of research center for Doctorate of Philosophy i.e. Ph. D. in Social Work by Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur, coaching and guidance center for SET Exam consented by Savitribai Phule University, Pune, etc., inception of new courses, etc. Moreover, the college is proudly heading towards its Silver Jubilee. The college has not delimited itself to BSW and MSW courses solely, but has also started new courses like BRIDGE/Bosch, Counseling Course, etc. Infact, many more of such are already in the process of inception. The college has study center for Asian International University and YCMOU, Nashik.



Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur has always been trying to tackle such social issues that are unconventional and often being neglected. The college has been working in close association with the Sarthi Trust, Nagpur, a NGO that works for the welfare of the Third Gender and LGBTQ in Nagpur. The students have been provided placement for the social work practicum at Sarthi Trust, which by default is the part of their curriculum. During these initiatives, the college found that the Third Gender and LGBTQ community had been facing various problems that had remained unaddressed till date. The college thus decided to lend a hand in this cause. As a first step towards this, the college signed a MoU with the Sarthi Trust to work towards the direction of social inclusion of the Third Gender and LGBTQ. Through MoU, various steps in the direction of bringing in positive changes were taken. The college provided admission to the Third Gender students in various courses, like BSW, MSW and Counseling Course. According to the first principle of the social work regarding acceptance, the college has tried to involve the participation of the Third Gender and LGBTQ in the activities along with the general students, community by creating a friendly atmosphere. To encourage the participation of the students, they were made members of the student oriented committees in the college as well as allotted the responsibility of Class Representative, University Representative, members of various committees, etc. Factually, there is representation of a Third Gender in IQAC as well. The students were encouraged to participate in the cultural activities as well. The college does not cease its efforts by solely motivating them to participate in the college. Through this, the college intends to develop leadership qualities in them along with the all round development of the community. Besides, the college has organized various programs in collaboration with the Sarthi Trust like Pride March, distribution of foodgrains, life saving drugs, clothes, etc. during intense period of lockdown, etc. The college has organized a State Level Seminar on HIV/AIDS on the eve of World AIDS day as well.

Besides during the difficult time of Covid and lockdown, the college along with its faculties and students decided to donate the grocery, Vitamin C tablets and other life saving items for the Third Gender community member, who lost their source of income during lockdown. The college has organized a skill development workshop for the students, so that the various skills among the students can be developed. Through this the students from the Third Gender were benefitted eventually dissuading them to opt for the traditional occupation and start their own venture and thus they do not have to depend on any one. The college is in the process of starting an Incubation Centre which will work in proximity with the RTMNU, Nagpur. The college has organised a meeting with the Maharashtra State Innovation Society, RTMNU Incubation Centre, where the college and the university were surprised to know the potential that the member had for initiating their own start up. Through this, the college has established a link with the university which would not only provide wider coverage to the community but also wider prospect of vocation and development.

The college wants that the LGBTQ and Third Gender, should develop their life through the education. It is found that they are not academically sharp in their studies, but also in leadership and participation in the extra-curricular activities. They take initiative in organizing and conducting any college level program successfully. The other students also enjoyed working with them without any kind of inhibitions or reservations. The increased participation of these students in the cultural activities, exposed themselves and to the college to a new side of their own personality. The various programs organized in collaboration with the Sarthi Trust like

Pride March, State Level Seminar on HIV/AIDS on the eve of World AIDS day, donation programme, etc. provided a close look at the problems faced by the community. The students of the Counseling Course are provided Observation Visit, Case Study and Field Work, as well as Block Placement.

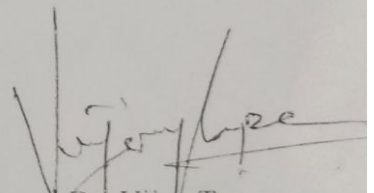
