



Two Best Practices

1. Title of the Practice: Educational, Social and Economic Inclusion of Third Gender (TG) and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer (LGBTQ) in the Main Stream Society.

Objective: 1. To motivate the TG and LGBTQ for higher studies by encouraging their admission in the institution.

2. To develop a friendly and conducive atmosphere of acceptance for TG and LGBTQ within the institution.

3. To identify the skill among the TG and LGBTQ and groom the same so that they can be tapped for vocational opportunity.

4. To make efforts so as to facilitate the TG and LGBTQ for breaking away from the traditional occupation.

5. To facilitate vocational opportunity for TG and LGBTQ through the college incubation centre.

Context: The vulnerable section of society the Third Gender (TG) and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer (LGBTQ) have always been a neglected section of society. The status of the Third Gender and LGBTQ had been high and of respect in the society as is found in the history. Though according to the age old Indian tradition, a common man finds the presence of the Third Gender auspicious during various occasions but socially, they are not accepted in the common day to day routine. They live a unorganized life sans any kind of facilities for them, nor proper implementation of any welfare policy provided to them. As a matter of fact, the community is unaware about it. Though the Article 377 has been in existence since long, the awareness regarding the same has been considerably low. There has been neither any legal provisions in favour of the Third Gender, nor any social acceptance. There has been no provision of formal vocational opportunity for them. They have to resort to the mean ways of earnings like begging. Even though, they have been officially recognized as the Third Gender, special arrangements like a separate toilet, cannot be found for the Third Gender.

Various problems like weak inclination towards pursuing education, absence of social acceptance in the society hindering their efforts to lead a normal life, lack of vocational opportunities as a reason of which they have to opt for dependence over other. Owing to their ways and means of earning and living they live with a very low self esteem and often various types of insults are inflicted upon them. The lack of proper channelization of their talent and skill on account of absence of skill development programme for them, lack of inclination among them to opt for an occupation other than the traditional one, etc. can be found.

Though they have a formal organization working for them, it only works to assure that their traditional vocation is carried out in an organized way. The community is never found protesting for their rights. As a matter of fact, they are oblivious about the constitutional rights provided to them. It is found that the community lives a lavish life with various kinds of facilities. But on the other hand they are very superstitious about various things. They live

a liberal life and are addictive to different kinds of addiction. They do not follow any kind of customs and traditions. They are hesitant to assimilate with anyone commonly, owing to their peculiar lifestyle. They are very apprehensive and are ready to quarrel with any one at the drop of the hat. All they desire is to have an equal footing with other people in their society like in other countries.

Practice: Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur has always been trying to tackle such social issues that are unconventional and often being neglected. In the past as well, the college through different initiatives have tried to bring in pragmatic change in the life of the depressed and vulnerable. The college has been working in close association with the Sarthi Trust, Nagpur, a NGO that works for the welfare of the Third Gender and LGBTQ in Nagpur. The students have been provided placement for the social work practicum at Sarthi Trust, which by default is the part of their curriculum. After understanding the gravity of the problems that the Third Gender faced in the society, the college decided to work for the social development of the community. The college signed a MoU with the Sarthi Trust to work towards the direction of social inclusion of the Third Gender and LGBTQ. Through MoU, various steps in the direction of bringing in positive changes, were taken. The college provided admission to the Third Gender in various courses. In the very first year, the response had been overwhelming as the students enthusiastically seek admission in BSW, MSW and Counselling Course. The college decided to break the invisible wall that, they thought, parted them with the regular students. According to the first principle of the social work regarding acceptance, the college has tried to involve the participation of the Third Gender and LGBTQ in the activities along with the general students, community by creating a friendly atmosphere. As the session progressed, to encourage the participation of the students, they were made members of the student oriented committees in the college as well as allotted the responsibility of Class Representative, University Representative, members of various committees, etc. Factually, there is representation of a Third Gender in IQAC as well. The students were encouraged to participate in the cultural activities as well. The college does not cease its efforts by solely motivating them to participate in the college. Through this, the college intends to develop leadership qualities in them along with the all round development of the community.

Besides, the college has organised various programs in collaboration with the Sarthi Trust like Pride March, State Level Seminar on HIV/AIDS on the eve of World AIDS Day. It is with their motivation that the college is now a member of Red Ribbon Club. Besides during the difficult time of Covid and lockdown, the college along with its faculties and students decided to donate the grocery, Vitamin C tablets and other life saving items for the Third Gender community member, who lost their source of income during lockdown. The college has organized a skill development workshop for the students, so that the various skills among the students can be developed. Through this the students from the Third Gender were benefitted eventually dissuading them to opt for the traditional occupation and start their own venture and thus they do not have to depend on any one.

The college is in the process of starting an Incubation Centre which will work in proximity with the RTMNU, Nagpur. The college has organised a meeting with the Maharashtra State Innovation Society, RTMNU Incubation Centre. Through this, the college has established a link with the university which would not only provide wider coverage to the community but also wider prospect of vocation and development.

Evidence of Success: The MoU so signed with the Sarthi Trust, Nagpur has provided the college a formal channel to work for the welfare of the LGBTQ and Third Gender. The Sarthi Trust being a reputed NGO of Nagpur, the college is able to identify the beneficiaries of the community for whom it wants to work. Moreover it also helps to lay down the roadmap of the progressive work, it wants to carry out. The college wants that the LGBTQ and Third Gender, should develop their life through the education. As a first step towards this, the college has provided admission to the students and it is found that they are not academically sharp in their studies, but also in leadership and participation in the extra-curricular activities. They take initiative in organizing and conducting any college level program successfully. It was found that when the students were made the members of the different committees involving student representation, they provided a fresh insight in the work culture as most of them have extensive field experience. These students, by leading in different initiatives, motivated other students to think innovatively, work creatively and with whole heartedness. The other students also enjoyed working with them without any kind of inhibitions or reservations. The increased participation of these students in the cultural activities, exposed themselves and to the college to a new side of their own personality. Factually, they are well versed in dance, there initiative to participate in the cultural activities of the college motivated other students to participate in the cultural activities enthusiastically.

The various programs organized in collaboration with the Sarthi Trust like Pride March, State Level Seminar on HIV/AIDS on the eve of World AIDS day, donation programme, etc. provided a close look at the problems faced by the community. The students of the Counselling Course are provided Observation Visit, Case Study and Field Work, as well as Block Placement. The faculties and the students while working in close association with the members of the Third Gender Community could have a close look at the kinds of problems faced by them.

Problems Encountered : - At the very first instance when the college offered admission to the LGBTQ and Third Gender, their attitude and approach towards education was passive and disinterested. They were unwilling to pursue their further studies. Hence, the faculties of the college had to try very hard to convince them to enrol in the college. They were convinced regarding the advantages of education, social work curriculum and the vocational opportunities like Counsellor over HIV/AIDS and other projects, Professional Social Worker, etc. available at the completion of the course. They were also convinced that they can be promoted with the qualification of BSW and MSW in their existing vocation. Once they were convinced regarding the course, their admissions poured in and they were very much keen to seek admission in the college. However, once they were ready, it was found that either they

did not have all the required documents or there were problem in the documents. Some of the students who had changed their gender had all the details of their prior gender on their document including their old name. The name on the gazette and the Adhar Card and other ID documents had been different. Thus the college provided all the required help to them to change their name and gender on all of their documents.

They had the hesitation of being able to mix with the other students. The faculties convinced that the students and other faculties would welcome them very warmly and if they are hesitant to come to the college, some of the faculties had been willing to teach them at their home voluntarily and after the college hours. They were ensured the provision of all the resource material to them and even the extension of the college library timing for them, so that they can study in the library without any hesitation. In this way, the faculties were able to gain the confidence of the Third Gender and LGBTQ students and encourage them to enrol in the college. As promised the college decided to generate awareness regarding them among the students by motivating them to refer the literature on Third Gender and LGBTQ.

Resources Required:- 1] The college wants to take initiative regarding removing the hesitation between the LGBTQ and TG and the common people so that the commoner can accept them without any kind of inhibition. There is a need of cooperation and coordination from both the sides.

2] The college needs the support and assistance of the national and international government and non-government organisation so that the sensitisation program can be organised at national and international level like Social Justice and Empowerment Dept. Dept. of Women and Child Welfare, National Commission for Women and State Commission for Women, etc. These initiatives would be taken in collaboration with Sarthi Trust.

3] The college want to create awareness regarding the Article 377 at national international level. The college wants the help of mass media, news paper, All India Radio, TV channels, etc. to create awareness regarding the social acceptance of LGBTQ and TG

4] The college wants the Nagpur Municipal Corporation to construct separate public toilets for TG and would soon hand over a petition to them.

Suggestions and Recommendations: 1] The college believes that the movies like 'Shubh Mangal Zyada Savdhan' which promotes the social acceptance should gain wider popularity.

2] The college wants to take the LGBTQ and TG students on shows over Radio like 'College Katta' broadcasted over Akashwani, Nagpur, the centre of All India Radio.

3] The college wants to promote the TG community to start their own start up like Unisex Saloons, Spas and Beauty Parlours.

Introduction: HIV, or Human Immunodeficiency Virus, weakens your immune system by destroying important cells that fight disease and infection. Over time, HIV can destroy so many of your T-cells or CD4 cells, a key part of your immune system, that your body can't fight infections and disease anymore. When this happens, HIV infection can lead to AIDS. AIDS, or Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome, is a complex illness with a wide range of complications and symptoms. AIDS is the final stage of HIV. When individuals reach this stage, they are at high risk for opportunistic infections due to their badly damaged immune system. HIV is found in specific human body fluids. One can be infected with HIV if any of the following fluids enter your body: Blood, Semen (cum), Pre-seminal fluid (pre-cum), Breast milk, Vaginal fluids, Rectal (anal) mucous. According to HIV.gov, other body fluids and waste products—like feces, nasal fluids, saliva, sweat, tears, urine, or vomit—don't contain enough HIV to infect you, unless they have blood mixed in them and you have significant and direct contact with them.

A one day workshop on 'HIV-AIDS Awareness Programme: Breaking the Ice' by Internal Quality Assurance Cell was organized at the college. The workshop was organized with the aim of creating the awareness regarding HIV/AIDS. The chief guest of the programme **Hon. Dr. Milind Mane, Ex-MLA, Nagpur** guided the students on the need of averting oneself from the pitfalls of HIV/AIDS. There are very specific ways that HIV can be transmitted through body fluids. During sexual contact one can contract HIV through anal, oral, or vaginal sex. During sexual contact, one has contact with your partner's body fluids, which can deliver the virus into your bloodstream through microscopic breaks or rips in the linings of the vagina, vulva, penis, rectum, or mouth. During pregnancy, childbirth, or breastfeeding, Babies can contract HIV through the contact they have with their mother's body fluids—including amniotic fluids and blood—through pregnancy and childbirth. Infants can also get HIV from drinking infected breast milk. As a result of injection drug use, Needles or drugs that are contaminated with HIV-infected blood can deliver the virus directly into your body. As a result of occupational exposure, Healthcare workers have the greatest risk for this type of HIV transmission because they may come in contact with infected blood or other fluids through needle sticks or cuts. As a result of blood transfusion with infected blood or an organ transplant from an infected donor. This method of transmission is extremely rare in the United States due to screening requirements. He also shared the first hand case studies regarding the internal and external strife that the HIV/AIDS patients have to face while being tackling the disease. The patients have to face the social stigmas for no fault of their.

Ms. Prachi Bagde, a professional counselor spoke upon the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) is a retrovirus that infects cells of the immune system, destroying or impairing their function. As the infection progresses, the immune system becomes weaker, and the person

becomes more susceptible to infections. The most advanced stage of HIV infection is acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS). It can take 10-15 years for an HIV-infected person to develop AIDS; antiretroviral drugs can slow down the process even further. An estimated 36.9 million people have HIV. More than 34 million people have died from the virus, making it one of the most destructive pandemics in history. Without addressing the problems caused by the HIV virus no real progress can be made. In previous years our projects included funding for voluntary testing and counselling, through an HIV and AIDS support group at Mukuni Health Centre. However, peer education for HIV and AIDS prevention is proving to be far more effective. School leavers have received extensive training to perform workshops in schools and communities. We have sponsored some 500 AIDS orphans in education, empowering them with knowledge to avoid the spread of HIV. We provide assistance for HIV mothers and orphans and funding for treatment for patients suffering from this debilitating disease. The HIV and AIDS support group, made up entirely of volunteers, work tirelessly to sensitise the communities, help to remove the stigma and offer voluntary testing and counselling. The Butterfly Tree supports these projects in order to reduce the number of new cases. In Zambia one in six adults have HIV and in the Livingstone area, 27% of the population are living with HIV. There are also many children who have been tested positive. Every family is infected or affected by this devastating disease. Our aim is to spread awareness through education, particularly targeting school children, who can make the change.

Her discourse was followed by the speech of **Hon. Mr. Vijay Bagde, representing UNICEF at India**. He opined that it is estimated that the majority of cases where the infection has been passed on are from those with undiagnosed HIV. Once diagnosed, people are less likely to pass on their infection due to treatment and behaviour change. It's essential for both the person with HIV and those with whom they may have sex that the condition is diagnosed early. It is also important to take steps to reduce your likelihood of getting HIV. If one has unprotected sex, you could effectively be sleeping with everyone your partner's ever slept with, putting yourself at risk of getting HIV or another sexually-transmitted infection (STI). If one is sexually active one should use condoms, limit the number of sexual partners, get tested if you think you might be at risk. In the global effort to end HIV and AIDS, children and adolescents continue to fall behind. New cases of infection still occur at birth, during breastfeeding and in adolescence; and not enough children and adolescents living with HIV have access to testing and life-saving treatment. As a result, hundreds die every day. "While there has been promising progress in the HIV response, children continue to be affected by the epidemic".

Most new infections in children and adolescents occur in sub-Saharan Africa, the epicenter of HIV and AIDS. To break the cycle of new infections and deaths, children, their mothers and adolescents must be tested for HIV and linked to treatment. A top priority for UNICEF is addressing structural factors – poverty, lack of education and violence – that put people, especially adolescent girls and young women, at risk of acquiring HIV. 2.8 million children and adolescents were living with HIV in 2018 — nearly 9 out of 10 in sub-Saharan Africa. Number of children and adolescents aged 0-19 living with HIV, by country, 2018. While the progress in HIV response has been promising, children continue to be affected by the epidemic. These are some of the statistics around HIV infections among children and adolescents in 2018: 2.8 million children and adolescents are living with HIV. Only 54 per cent of infected children and adolescents are on HIV treatment as compared to 82 per cent of pregnant women living with

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HIV, 360,000 new infections were estimated among children and adolescents, 120,000 children and adolescents died from AIDS-related causes. Treatment and prevention for children and adolescents are the two areas of UNICEF's work to stop HIV infections and AIDS deaths. Making sustainable gains in this work requires increased commitment, better policies and more funds at the global, regional and national levels.

Hon. Mr. Anand Chandrani, SAARTHI Trust, India guided that the longer-term treatment programs for substance-related and addictive disorders can be highly effective and typically focus on remaining drug-free and resuming function within social, professional, and family responsibilities. Fully licensed residential facilities are available to structure a 24-hour care program, provide a safe housing environment, and supply any necessary medical interventions or assistance. A few types of facility can provide a therapeutic environment, including: Short-Term Residential Treatment: This focuses on detoxification and preparing an individual for a longer period within a therapeutic community through intensive counseling; Therapeutic Communities: A person seeking long-term treatment for severe forms of addictive disorder would live in a residence for between 6 and 12 months with on-site staff and others in recovery. The community and staff serve as key factors in recovery from and changes in attitudes and behaviors toward drug use; Recovery Housing: This provides a supervised, short-term stay in housing to help people engage with responsibilities and adapt to a new, independent life without on-going substance use. Recovery housing includes advice on handling finances and finding work, as well as providing the connection between a person during the final stages of recovery and community support services; Self-Help Groups: Group therapy and long-term rehabilitation can help a person with a substance use disorder feel less isolated.

These may help the recovering individual meet others with the same addictive disorder which often boosts motivation and reduces feelings of isolation. They can also serve as a useful source of education, community, and information. Examples include Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) and Narcotics Anonymous (NA). People who struggle with other types of addiction can find out about self-help groups in their community either by an internet search or by asking a doctor or nurse for information; Medications: A person might take medication on a continuous basis when recovering from a substance-related disorder and its related complications. However, people most commonly use medications during detoxification to manage withdrawal symptoms. The medication will vary depending on the substance that the person is addicted to. Longer-term use of medications helps to reduce cravings and prevent relapse, or a return to using the substance after having recovered from addiction. Medication is not a standalone treatment for addiction and should accompany other management methods such as psychotherapy. Addiction to the following substances requires specific medications.

People with alcohol use disorder can take the following medications to reduce cravings and withdrawal symptoms, including: Naltrexone: This prevents the action of opioid receptors in the brain that produce rewarding and euphoric effects when a person consumes alcohol and reduces the risk of relapse. While not effective for all people in recovery, it has a considerable impact on abstinence in some people; Acamprosate, or Campral: This might reduce long-term withdrawal symptoms, including sleeplessness, anxiety, and a general feeling of unhappiness known as dysphoria. This has a more beneficial effect in people with severe substance-related and addictive disorders; Disulfiram, or Antabuse: This is a medication that disrupts the breakdown of alcohol, leading to adverse effects including facial redness, feeling sick, and an irregular heartbeat should the person in recovery attempt to consume alcohol. It acts as a deterrent for people who have high motivation levels toward recovery.

Doctors and rehabilitation specialists may prescribe other medication to address other possible mental health conditions, including depression and anxiety, that may be a cause or result of substance-related disorders. People in treatment programs should also receive testing for infectious diseases that might have resulted from certain high-risk situations associated with their addictive disorders such as HIV, hepatitis, and tuberculosis.

Stigma and discrimination that is directed towards people living with HIV affects us in a number of different ways. Whether it is discrimination from others in the wider community, from peers or the people closest to us, negative attitudes or prejudice can have lasting effects and limit the way we access HIV testing, treatment or other services. The consequences of stigma and discrimination are wide-ranging. Some people are shunned by family, peers and the wider community, while others face poor treatment in healthcare and educational settings, erosion of their human rights, and psychological damage. These all limit access to HIV testing, treatment and other HIV services. In 2012, the Department of Forensic Medicine Glebe refused to reconstruct the bodies of people with HIV and/or HCV after conducting an autopsy. NSW was the only jurisdiction in Australia with this policy. This policy caused unwanted disclosure and distress to partners and family members of the deceased and was particularly problematic for the families of rural and Aboriginal people with HIV.

Positive Life thought the policy unnecessary and discriminatory and considered that it reinforced and perpetuated the stigma of infectiousness attached to people with HIV and HCV. Following a submission to the Department of Forensic Medicine by Positive Life they informed us that they would develop a new technique for the restoration of bodies after autopsy which eliminated the use of the suture needle and therefore improved safety for mortuary staff. Reconstruction of HIV/HCV infected bodies was subsequently implemented following further refinement of the trialled technique. Additionally, NSW Public Health Regulation 2011 was modified whereby bodies released to funeral homes no longer had any indication of HIV or Hep C.

The worldwide HIV epidemic has created a terrible burden for millions of individuals, families and communities around the world. Relieving it requires improved healthcare, better access to treatments, more vigorous prevention efforts, more effective social outreach, and support for those most vulnerable -- particularly orphans.

But there is another terrible burden imposed by AIDS, which each and every one of us has the capacity to relieve: the burden of HIV-related stigma.

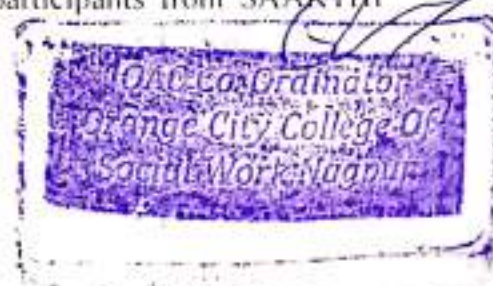
Dr. Vijayalaxmi Nandapurkar, Principal summed up the workshop by citing that But the walls of stigma and silence are weakening. There is evidence of progress on every continent. Leaders are speaking out at the highest level. The rights of people living with HIV/AIDS are being defended through the courts. Standards are being set in the workplace. Schools, the media and youth education programmes are helping to create a generation better equipped to live in the world of AIDS. And last year, at a Special Session of the General Assembly, all the Member States of the United Nations unanimously adopted a Declaration of Commitment on HIV/AIDS which sent a clear message around the world. They pledged to enact or enforce legislation outlawing discrimination against people living with HIV and members of vulnerable groups.

But whatever laws and regulations are adopted, the most powerful weapons against stigma and silence are the voices of the world's people speaking up about AIDS. By adopting the slogan "Live and Let Live," this year's World AIDS Campaign challenges us to ensure that all people, with or without HIV, can realize their human rights and live in dignity. On this World AIDS Day, let us resolve to replace stigma with support, fear with hope, silence with solidarity. Let us act on the understanding that this work begins with each and every one of us.

Some people with AIDS are being denied basic rights such as food or shelter, and dismissed from jobs they are perfectly fit to perform. They may be shunned by their community, or most tragic of all, by their own family.

The fear of stigma leads to silence, and when it comes to fighting AIDS, silence is death. It suppresses public discussion about AIDS, and deters people from finding out whether they are infected. It can cause people -- whether a mother breastfeeding her child or a sexual partner reluctant to disclose their HIV status -- to risk transmitting HIV rather than attract suspicion that they might be infected.

Orange City College of Social Work, Nagpur took initiative to distribute Grains, Life Saving Drugs and Vitamins among Third Gender in collaboration with Saarthi Trust, Nagpur at Lata Mangeshkar Hospital, Nagpur, premises on 29th April, 2021. During the process, more than eighty members of the Third Gender community were benefited. As a part of donation, the faculties and the students donated grains like wheat, rice, pulses, soybean, salt and sanitary items like soap, toothpaste, shampoo, etc.

A One Day Workshop on HIV/AIDS

Date: 30th August, 2021

Introduction: A one day workshop on HIV/AIDS was organized by Internal Quality Assurance Cell was organized at the college. The workshop was organized with the aim of creating awareness regarding the concept of Intellectual Property Rights. The chief guest of the programme **Mr. Nikunj Joshi**, Saarthi Trust, Nagpur, **Ms. Tanuja Phale**, District Coordinator, Red Ribbon Club and **Ms. Achal Sharma**, Counsellor, Saarthi Trust, Nagpur guided the students regarding HIV/AIDS.

HIV (*human immunodeficiency virus*) is a virus that attacks cells that help the body fight infection, making a person more vulnerable to other infections and diseases. It is spread by contact with certain bodily fluids of a person with HIV, most commonly during unprotected sex (sex without a condom or HIV medicine to prevent or treat HIV), or through sharing injection drug equipment. If left untreated, HIV can lead to the disease AIDS (*acquired immunodeficiency syndrome*).

Mr. Nikunj Joshi, Saarthi Trust, Nagpur said that the human body can't get rid of HIV and no effective HIV cure exists. So, once you have HIV, you have it for life. However, by taking HIV medicine (called antiretroviral therapy or ART), people with HIV can live long and healthy lives and prevent HIV transmission to their sexual partners. In addition, there are effective methods to prevent getting HIV through sex or drug use.

HIV was first identified in 1981. HIV is the cause of one of humanity's deadliest and most persistent epidemics. **The only way to know for sure if you have HIV is to get tested.** Testing is relatively simple. You can ask your health care provider for an HIV test. Many medical clinics, substance abuse programs, community health centers, and hospitals offer them too. You can also buy a home testing kit at a pharmacy or online.

Self testing is also an option. Self-testing allows people to take an HIV test and find out their result in their own home or other private location. You can buy a self-test kit at a pharmacy or online. Some health departments or community-based organizations also provide self-test kits for free. HIV continues to be a major global public health issue, having claimed 36.3 million [27.2–47.8 million] lives so far.

Ms. Tanuja Phale, District Coordinator, Red Ribbon Club said that there is no cure for HIV infection. However, with increasing access to effective HIV prevention, diagnosis, treatment and care, including for opportunistic infections, HIV infection has become a manageable chronic health condition, enabling people living with HIV to lead long and healthy lives. There were an estimated 37.7 million [30.2–45.1 million] people living with HIV at the end of 2020, over two thirds of whom (25.4 million) are in the WHO African Region.

She said that in 2020, 680 000 [480 000–1.0 million] people died from HIV-related causes and 1.5 million [1.0–2.0 million] people acquired HIV. To reach the new proposed global 95–95–95 targets set by UNAIDS, we will need to redouble our efforts to avoid the worst-case scenario of a

half million excess HIV-related deaths in sub-Saharan Africa, increasing HIV infections due to HIV service disruptions during COVID-19, and the slowing public health response to HIV.

Ms. Achal Sharma, Counsellor, Saarthi Trust, Nagpur opined that the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) targets the immune system and weakens people's defense against many infections and some types of cancer that people with healthy immune systems can fight off. As the virus destroys and impairs the function of immune cells, infected individuals gradually become immunodeficient. Immune function is typically measured by CD4 cell count.

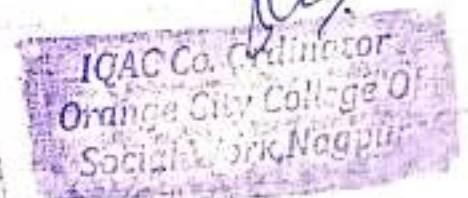
The most advanced stage of HIV infection is acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS), which can take many years to develop if not treated, depending on the individual. AIDS is defined by the development of certain cancers, infections or other severe long-term clinical manifestations

HIV is a virus that most likely mutated decades ago from a virus that infected chimpanzees to one that infects humans. It began to spread beyond the African continent in the late 1970s and is now endemic worldwide. It causes disease because it attacks critical immune defense cells and over time overwhelms the immune system.

Dr. Chandansingh Rotele, Hon. President, Gram Utkarsh Shikshan Sanstha, Nagpur said that without treatment, HIV infection starts to cause symptoms in an average of eight to 10 years with AIDS-related opportunistic illnesses, or diseases that only cause illness in people with impaired immune function. This symptomatic phase has been referred to as acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) or HIV disease. HIV is a lifelong infection, but it is treatable and can be controlled with medications. With consistent treatment using highly specialized antiviral medications, a person with HIV may live about as long as an uninfected person.

Statistics show that approximately 40 million people are currently living with HIV infection, and an estimated 40 million have died from this disease since the beginning of the epidemic. HIV has been particularly devastating in sub-Saharan Africa, which accounts for almost 70% of new HIV infections globally. However, infection rates in other countries also remain high.

Report on Awareness Program on POSCO Act

Date: 18th February, 2023

- Objective:**
1. To educate communities about the provisions of the POSCO Act.
 2. To raise awareness among parents, children, and people among the rural area about the signs of child sexual abuse and the procedures for reporting such incidents.
 3. To empower stakeholders with knowledge and resources to prevent and respond to instances of child sexual abuse effectively.
 4. To foster a culture of child safety and protection within the community.

Introduction: A prog. on Awareness regarding POSCO Act, 2012 was organised for creating sensitisation regarding the features of the act. During the prog. Mr. Gaurav Alne, member, Andrashraddha Nirmulan Samiti updated the students and the people of the village regarding the act. He said that the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012, is a crucial legislation in India aimed at protecting children from sexual abuse and exploitation. However, despite its significance, there remains a concerning lack of awareness about the act among various stakeholders. To address this gap, awareness program on the POSCO Act is very important to be organised for each and every member of the community. This would lead to the education of communities, parents, children, and other relevant stakeholders about the provisions and importance of the act.

The sessions focused on explaining the various aspects of the POSCO Act, including definitions of sexual offenses against children, reporting procedures, legal provisions for the protection of child victims, and the role of different stakeholders in ensuring child safety. During the session, the common myths and misconceptions surrounding child sexual abuse, ways to recognize signs of abuse, and strategies for creating safe environments for children. He said that lately, the Govt. and the civil societies has taken various initiatives by launching a series of awareness campaigns using various mediums such as posters, pamphlets, social media, and community events. These campaigns aimed to

disseminate information about the POSCO Act to a wider audience and encourage active participation in child protection efforts.

He said that lately a host of training programs were conducted for frontline workers, including teachers, healthcare professionals, and law enforcement personnel, to equip them with the knowledge and skills required to identify and respond to cases of child sexual abuse sensitively and effectively. These programs provide awareness and information to the children, parents and guardian to understand and make children understand the difference between the good and bad touch. He also said that it was important to establish a network for creating awareness among the stakeholders besides the children.

It is important to establish collaboration with local authorities, schools, NGOs, ICDS centres and anganwadi teachers and community leaders was integral to the success of the awareness program. These partnerships facilitated the dissemination of information, mobilization of resources, and implementation of child protection initiatives at the grassroots level.

The awareness program succeeded in significantly increasing awareness about the POSCO Act and child sexual abuse within the target communities. During the question and answers session, various aspects like the legal provisions and procedures for reporting abuse. Stakeholders, including parents, children, educators, and community members, should be empowered with knowledge and resources to protect children from sexual offenses. During the program the encouragement to positive behavioural changes, adoption of proactive measures to create safer environments for children. This included implementing child protection policies in schools, establishing support systems for victims, and advocating for stricter enforcement of child protection laws was discussed. The awareness program fostered greater community engagement and collective responsibility towards child protection. Communities became more vigilant and supportive of efforts to prevent and address child sexual abuse.

Conclusion

The awareness program on the POSCO Act played a crucial role in educating stakeholders, raising awareness, and fostering a culture of child safety and protection within the community. Continued efforts and collaborations are essential to sustain the momentum generated by the program and ensure the effective implementation of child protection measures.

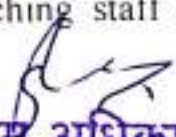

In the session 2022-23, the students of BSW and MSW participated in the 'Pride March' organized on 7th January, 2023 by the Sarthi Trust, Nagpur a collaborative institution of the college. During the program, the students and the faculties participated in the Pride March, celebrated with equal enthusiasm and fanfare, especially after the Supreme Court in 2018 struck down the draconian Article 377 that criminalised gay sex.

However, this is mostly limited to metros as smaller cities have still not been able to accept it. To eradicate this stigma and discrimination, Sarthi Trust is toiling day and night. It has not only been successful in sensitising the society to LGBTQIA+ issues but it has also been able to assist the community in dealing with Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs).

Conclusion: The active participation of the college along with the students in the Pride March instilled a sense of confidence and the motivation among the the LGBTQ and Third Gender Community. It was an opportunity for the students to shed off their inhibitions regarding the LGBTQ and the Third Gender and embrace them with the open arms.

A Report on One Day Workshop on ICT

Date: 23rd February, 2022

Introduction:- In the present situation, the knowledge of Information Communication Technology play an important role. The ICT includes the use of the knowledge of the computers, browsing over the internet, access to the relevant website, use of the latest technology for the educational purpose, etc. In the post covid society, the importance of the computer has increased as from education to entertainment, everything has gone online. The students need to brace themselves with the knowledge of ICT to be updated with the latest trends of the education. With this aim, a one day workshop on ICT was organized by IQAC to create awareness regarding the ICT among the students.

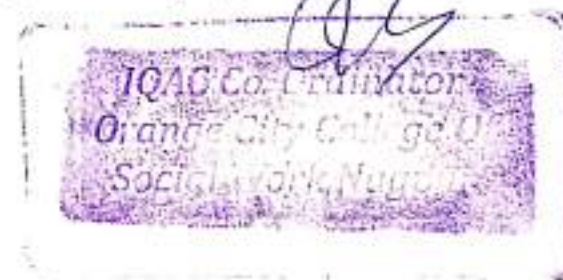

Hence, they are always confused regarding the proper sites and portals for various things like the university, scholarship, Fellowship, exams, results, etc. and often come to the teaching and nonteaching faculties at the confused state at the last stage. Hence, they should be at the front foot in the knowledge and use of ICT with this respect as well. In such case, this program would be consider as successful.

Introduction: A one day workshop on **Information Communication Technology (ICT)** was organized by IQAC on 14th Dec., 2022. Ms. Neeetu Mishra, Zonal Director, UPAY NGO oriented regarding the use of ICT in teaching, learning and research. During the workshop, she said ICT, or information and communications technology (or technologies), is the infrastructure and components that enable modern computing. Among the goals of IC technologies, tools and systems is to improve the way humans create, process and share data or information with each other. Another is to help them improve their abilities in numerous areas, including business; education; medicine; real-world problem-solving; and even leisure activities related to sports, music, and movies.

There is no single, universal definition of ICT because the technologies, devices and even ideas related to ICT are constantly evolving. However, the term is generally accepted to mean all devices, networking components and applications. When combined, these help people and organizations interact in the digital world.

Information and communications technology (ICT) is an extensional term for information technology (IT) that stresses the role of unified communications and the integration of telecommunications (telephone lines and wireless signals) and computers, as well as necessary enterprise software, middleware, storage and audio-visual, that enable users to access, store, transmit, understand and manipulate information.

ICT is also used to refer to the convergence of audio-visuals and telephone networks with computer networks through a single cabling or link system. There are large economic incentives to merge the telephone networks with the computer network system using a single unified system of cabling, signal distribution, and management. ICT is an umbrella term that includes any communication device, encompassing radio, television, cell phones, computer and network hardware, satellite systems and so on, as well as the various services and appliances with them such as video conferencing and distance learning.

ICT also includes analog technology, such as paper communication, and any mode that transmits communication.

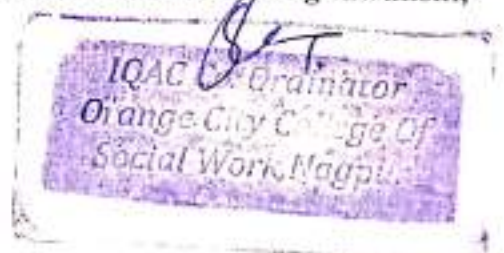
ICT is a broad subject and the concepts are evolving. It covers any product that will store, retrieve, manipulate, process, transmit, or receive information electronically in a digital form (e.g., personal computers including smartphones, digital television, email, or robots). Skills Framework for the Information Age is one of many models for describing and managing competencies for ICT professionals in the 21st century.

Colleges use a diverse set of ICT tools to communicate, create, disseminate, store, and manage information. In some contexts, ICT has also become integral to the teaching-learning interaction, through such approaches as replacing chalkboards with interactive digital whiteboards, using students' own smartphones or other devices for learning during class time, and the "flipped classroom" model where students watch lectures at home on the computer and use classroom time for more interactive exercises.

When teachers are digitally literate and trained to use ICT, these approaches can lead to higher order thinking skills, provide creative and individualized options for students to express their understandings, and leave students better prepared to deal with ongoing technological change in society and the workplace.

ICT issues planners must consider include: considering the total cost-benefit equation, supplying and maintaining the requisite infrastructure, and ensuring investments are matched with teacher support and other policies aimed at effective ICT use.

Conclusion: The workshop provided broad perspective on ICT for faculties, students especially for research scholars. It enlightened about concepts of ICT, use of ICT at college level, role of ICT in research.
